Where do I begin?

- Possess a non-education baccalaureate degree from a regionally accredited university;
- Apply for admission to McNeese State University and receive acceptance.
- Hold an overall 2.20 grade point average or higher on a 4.0 scale.

What's my next step?

1. Attend the Alternative Certification Orientation held at McNeese State University.
2. Minimum grade of "C" or better in EDTC 100.
3. **Pass PRAXIS I, Pre-Professional Skills Tests (PPST)**, Reading, Writing, and Mathematics. In lieu of Praxis I (PPST) an ACT composite score of 22 or a SAT combined verbal and math score of 1030 is acceptable. Candidates who already possess a graduate (Master's) degree will be exempted from PRAXIS I.
4. **Pass PRAXIS II content-specific subject area examination. Chemistry: Content Knowledge (0245)**
5. Complete Teacher Education admissions packet (EDUC 499). Submit it to the MSU Department of Teacher Education, Farrar Hall Room 240 and request signed program prescription.

Candidates seeking teacher certification through the McNeese State University Non-Master's Program must complete all course work listed in addition to student teaching/internship at the University

Praxis exams are scores that are subject to change at anytime, therefore, it's extremely important that you keep abreast of changes through the state page on www.ets.org .

Important Note: You must establish and maintain a **3.0 GPA** on a 4.0 scale on teacher preparation course work listed below . In addition, you **must maintain a 3.0 GPA** for the student teaching/internship segments. You must earn a "C" or better in all certification course work, however, earning a "C" in these courses will greatly decrease your chance of earning the required 3.0 GPA. In order to be admitted to the Alternate Non-Master's Certification Program at McNeese State University and advance in course work level, **you must fulfill all requirements.** * State Completers please refer to state mandates
